INTERNATIONAL DAY AGAINST HOMOPHOBIA, TRANSPHOBIA & BIPHOBIA



MAY 17 A Worldwide Celebration of Sexual and Gender Diversities











In 70 countries, loving someone of the same sex is illegal and, in 7 countries, it is punishable by death. In many more countries citizens are denied their right to live as their true gender identity, and 369 murders of trans and gender-diverse people were reported worldwide in 2018. As well as legal discriminations, social homophobia, biphobia and transphobia daily serve to deny millions of people across the world their basic human dignity. International Day Against Homophobia, Transphobia and Biphobia (IDAHOTB) was created in 2004 to draw the attention of policymakers, opinion leaders, social movements, the public and the media to this issue. The date of May 17th was specifically chosen to commemorate the World Health Organization's decision in 1990 to declassify homosexuality as a mental disorder. IDAHOTB is now celebrated in more than 120 countries. LGBTQIA+ organisations, governments, cities, human rights organisations, corporations and celebrities have all taken action on May 17th to:

- Draw media attention to the issue of homophobia, biphobia and transphobia
- Demand attention from policymakers and engage in lobbying activities
- Network with like-minded organizations and develop new partnerships, at home or beyond.

2019 also marks the 50th anniversary of the Stonewall Riot, a spontaneous demonstration by LGBTQIA+ people against a discriminatory police raid on 28th June 1969 at the Stonewall Inn in New York. The riot, which lasted five nights, was a galvanizing moment for the LGBTQIA+ activist community to unite in a movement fighting for LGBTQIA+ rights. The following year of action culminated on the anniversary of the Stonewall Riot in the Christopher Street Liberation Day March, considered to be the first Pride. **Read more: stonewallforever.org**

The liturgy for tonight's service was adapted from multiple sources, particularly the National Coming Out Day materials, Human Rights Campaign 2006, unless otherwise stated.

Welcome

Leader: We gather in the name of God,

peace-maker, reconciler, activist.

All: Amen

Leader: Blessed are the peacemakers.

All: For they will be called children of God.

Leader: Blessed are those who are persecuted

for righteousness' sake.

All: For theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Matthew 5:8-9

Leader: Come in peace, breaking down old misunderstandings,

welcoming strangers, learning new languages, greeting one another as children of God!

All: We come, praising God!

Leader: Praise the God who made us all, who loves us all,

who calls us together so that we might sing 'Alleluia'!

All: Praise God! Alleluia! Amen.

We sing a love that sets all people free, that blows like wind, that burns like scorching flame,

Leader:

Holy One who knows us well, who cherishes our deepest yearnings, channelling our desires toward the great end of your love, we confess our fear of passion, our shame over our deepest needs, grant us courage to speak uncomfortable truths, to confront the lies that tinge love with shame; assure of us of your embrace of all of us, even those parts of ourselves that the world treats with scorn, lift us up, make us strong, that we might be a light that sheds your truth before all, that speaks through our lives of your surprising grace.

Act of reconciliation:

Come and place a stone at the foot of the tree to represent what has caused you to stumble on your journey towards peace and reconciliation, especially around your faith, gender and sexuality.

Take a leaf from the tree to represent what has helped

you to grow.

Meanwhile music plays 'I'll stand by you' by The Pretenders.

Leader: Thank you Lord,

that even though we have all fallen short of your glory,

we still walk in the light of your grace and love. Thank you Lord, that you are kind, tender-hearted and forgiving of us so that we can be kind, tender-hearted and forgiving of others and ourselves. In the name of Christ, our Lord,

Leader:

God who opens doors and dismantles barriers, open our hearts to praise you that we might live the full truth of who we are, that we might live as neighbours and friends, no longer strangers and enemies; open our hearts to the transforming power of your love that we might forgive and reconcile, making peace and learning war no more, that we might be your people, one body in one Spirit, to tell your grace to all the world.

First reading:

This Bible verse has been chosen to help fight homophobia. Most LGBT people are more used to the Bible being used against them, but these LGBT Christians draw upon it for support. An Italian LGBT Christian Network have chosen this particular Bible verse for use at vigils and other services to mark this year's International Day Against Homophobia, Transphobia and Biphobia.

The Italian LGBT Christian network *Progetto Gionata* recently held an online poll to choose a Bible passage appropriate to use at services and vigils to commemorate this campaign. The winning passage comes from the book of Isaiah, chapter 43:1-4:

'Have no fear, for I have taken up your cause; naming you by your name, I have made you mine. Because of your value in my eyes, you have been honoured, and loved by me.'

Eucharistic Prayer II for Reconciliation adapted from the 1975 Roman Missal

Leader: Father, all powerful and ever living God,

we praise and thank you through Jesus Christ our Lord

for your presence and action in the world.

In the midst of conflict and division, we know it is you who turns our minds

to thoughts of peace.

Your Spirit changes our hearts: enemies begin to speak to one another,

those who were estranged join hands in friendship,

and nations seek the way of peace together.

Your Spirit is at work when understanding puts an end to strife, when hatred is quenched by mercy, and vengeance gives way to forgiveness.

For this we never cease to thank and praise you.

We join with all the choirs of heaven as they sing for ever to your glory:

All:

Holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Leader:

God of power and might, we praise you through your Son, Jesus Christ, who comes in your name. He is the Word that brings salvation. He is the hand you stretch out to sinners. He is the way that leads to your peace.

God our Father, we had wandered far from you, but through your Son you have brought us back. You gave him up to death so that we might turn again to you and find our way to one another. Therefore we celebrate the reconciliation Christ has gained for us.

We ask you to sanctify these gifts by the power of your Spirit, as we now fulfil your Son's command.

While he was at supper on the night before he died for us, he took bread in his hands and gave you thanks and praise. He broke the bread, gave it to his disciples, and said:

'Take this, all of you, and eat it; this is my body which will be given up for you.' At the end of the meal he took the cup. Again he praised you for your goodness, gave the cup to his disciples, and said:

'Take this, all of you, and drink from it; this is the cup of my blood, the blood of the new and everlasting covenant.

It will be shed for you and for all so that sins may be forgiven. Do this in memory of me.'

Let us proclaim the mystery of faith:

All: When we eat this bread and drink this cup, we proclaim your death, Lord Jesus, until you come in glory.

Leader: Lord our God,

your Son has entrusted to us this pledge of love. We celebrate the memory of his death and resurrection and bring you the gift you have given us, the sacrifice of reconciliation.

Therefore, we ask you, Father, to accept us, together with your Son. Fill us with his Spirit through our sharing in this meal. May he take away all that divides us.

May this Spirit keep us always in communion with all your people.
Father, make your Church throughout the world a sign of unity and an instrument of your peace.

You have gathered us here around the table of your Son. In that new world where the fullness of your peace will be revealed, gather people of every race, language and way of life to share in the one eternal banquet with Jesus Christ our Lord.

Through him, with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honour are yours, almighty God, for ever and ever.
